CANDLELIGHT PASSWORD

August 10, 2023

O-AT-KA Friends and Family, it's great to be here with all of you on this final night of camp.

Last year, I gave a password about moving a rock. I talked about how I rolled a large rock underwater from Greenridge to the center of the (under water) rock garden that's just out past the H-dock. I talked about how the process of diving down, flipping the rock, coming up, breathing, and repeating was a surprisingly meditative one that let my mind wander.

This year I returned to find the rock, of course, right where I'd left it, the movement process completed, in

the spot where it will likely rest for a while longer. And I was struck by how it made me feel good to know that I have left a physical mark in the rock garden that will likely outlast my time as a counselor here at O-AT-KA. I don't know if you've ever had that feeling when seeing some physical trace of your passing, I get it when I see a tree that I planted growing tall at our family farm. You might get it if you see your name on the wall of a cabin that you stayed in years ago.

But leaving a mark doesn't need to be a physical thing. You can leave a mark on camp culture by playing a song that spreads throughout camp, or by giving someone a camp nickname that sticks, like I did with a first session camper named Stooch. You can also leave a mark on people, by teaching them a card game or by introducing them to a new song that becomes one of their favorites (like Russell Wylie did for little Junior Sam Kumler when he played "The General" all summer long). And I think that this, leaving a mark on people, is the most wonderful, and rewarding way to leave a mark. And, if I can be a little philosophical for a bit, we are always leaving a mark on everyone around us, and we are always being impacted by those around us. You see, we are all the result of the collection of our experiences, of what we've been taught, of what we've seen, of what we remember.

You are who you are because of what you have experienced, because of the world around you. And this means that, as you are part of the world around them, you have an impact on everyone around you. You impact who they are, not always in a large way, or even one that you can easily notice, but you do with every single interaction.

And I think that that's why having all these good people around us at camp is so important. Every single

interaction that we have here is adding an experience and is shaping who you are. The beauty of O-AT-KA is that these people—the ones who are shaping you with every conversation, running joke, instruction, and game played together—are funny, smart, positive, and generally GOOD people. THAT is why, when people ask what the best thing about camp is, or what I'll miss most, or what makes 0-AT-KA unique; I say the people. The people I've known in my nine summers at camp, from those who have been here each year like George, to my counselor role models, to those of you who first arrived on the shores of Sebago fewer than three weeks ago; each of whom have helped make me into the man that I am, standing here today. Just as all of us have, in some smaller or larger way, shaped each of you into the person that you are today.

This, the ability to shape others, might seem like a big responsibility. But I'm not trying to say that you should go out of your way to alter people's lives or that you should do wacky things so that they never forget you. I'm saying that you are always leaving your mark on people, whether you're trying to or not, and that your goal should be to make it a positive one.

So, as you go back out into the world, as you return to school, or work, or eventually back to O-AT-KA, I encourage you to ensure that your inevitable impact on those around you is positive, and that the mark that you leave is one that you can be proud of.

I hope that I have had a positive impact on some of the people that I've been around at camp over these nine summers, and I know that every single person I've spent time at camp with, including you, has left a mark on me.

The password for tonight is 'Leave Your Mark.'
